



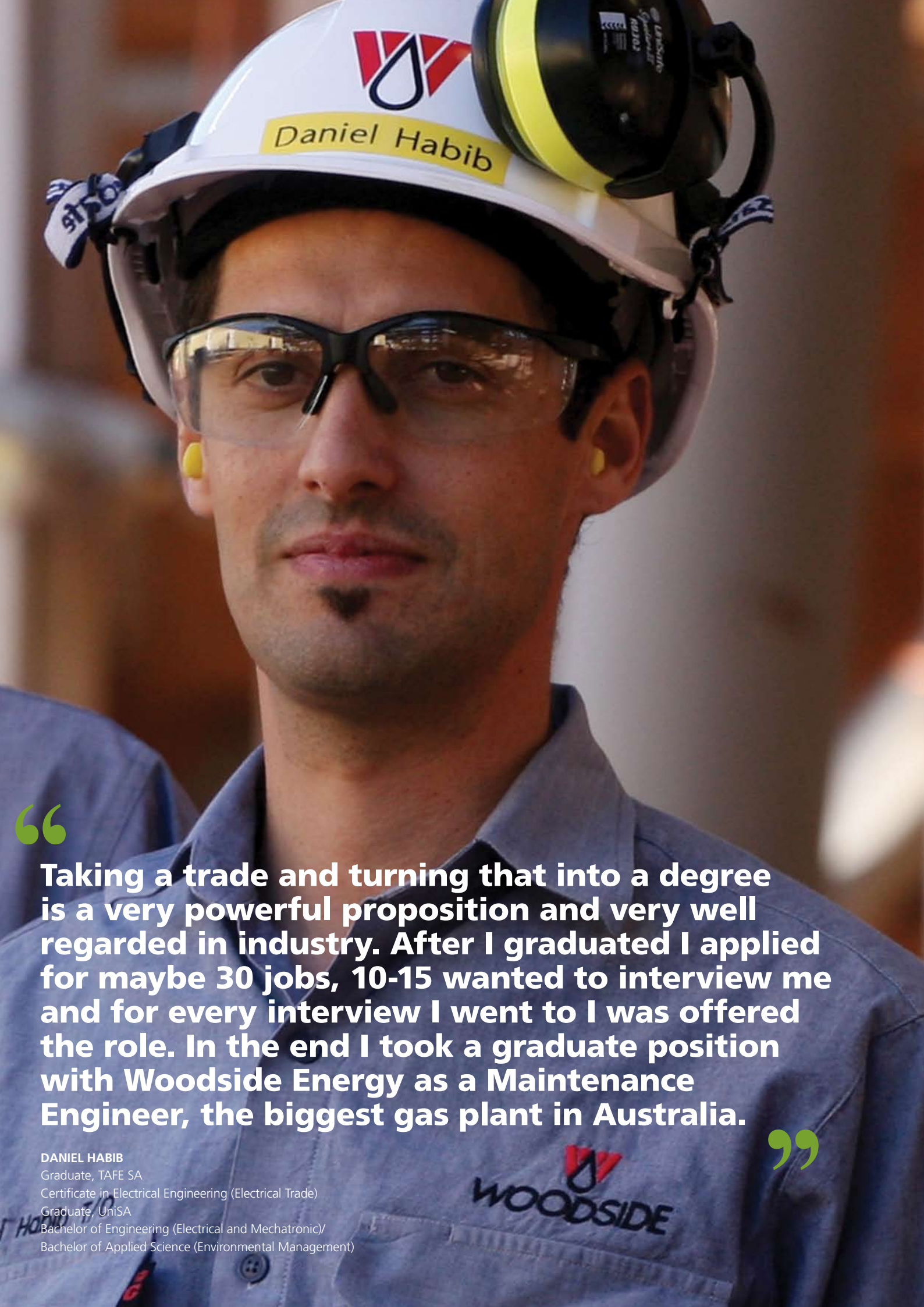

## UniSA has more credit transfer and pathways arrangements with TAFE and Registered Training Organisations than any other South Australian university.

A Certificate IV, Diploma or Advanced Diploma from TAFE or other registered training providers is accepted for entry into many UniSA programs. If you receive a place in a program on this basis, you'll be able to obtain credit for your previous study. You can also apply for additional credit, up to a specified maximum, for completed TAFE and RTO subjects that are relevant to your UniSA program.

# City West Campus



# City East Campus

The **City West campus** on North Terrace is located at the western edge of Adelaide's central business district, it is home to UniSA's Division of Business with its focus on business, commerce, marketing, management, tourism and event management. It's also the home of UniSA's vibrant visual art, design and architecture programs, along with the University's Australian and Indigenous Studies.

City West is a progressive campus with facilities that include modern lecture theatres, wireless computer network access, comfortable study spaces, an art gallery for exhibiting works by students, specialised visual art design studios and a purpose built industrial design workshop. The library's collection strengths include accounting and information systems, business, law, marketing and visual arts architecture and design. The School of Law is located in a heritage-listed building on the corner of George and Hindley Streets. Designed by prominent architect Kenneth Milne and built

during the war years, it was once the headquarters for the South Australian Brewing Company. The Law Building has been updated with the addition of a Moot Court which has been created for students to participate in real life debates.

Aside from designated teaching and learning areas, City West's campus amenities also include Aroma Café, outdoor dining areas, a cafeteria, bookshop and a post office. Complementing the campus's artistic environs are the Kaurna and Dorrit Black buildings, both of which feature innovative and state-of-the-art facilities for visual arts, design and architectural studies. The contemporary Hawke Building features the second largest public art gallery in the state, the Anne and Gordon Samstag Museum of Art. Also within the Hawke Building is the Kerry Packer Civic Gallery, an area purpose-built for exhibitions relating to culture, history and social debate, and the Allan Scott Auditorium, designed for student and public lectures.

UniSA's **City East campus** is situated on the corner of North Terrace and Frome Road in the city centre of Adelaide, an area that is rich in history and culture. Anchored by the impressive Brookman Building, City East is a fusion of neo-gothic architecture and modern contemporary design. Recent upgrades have seen the implementation of new computing facilities plus a wireless internet network, giving students the flexibility to study anywhere on campus and at any time. The library collection at City East covers several speciality areas including medical and health sciences, human movement, nursing, midwifery, transport, psychology and geoinformatics. City East is recognised as a health hub and the place for undergraduate studies in health science. Many of the state's health professionals, such as podiatrists, physiotherapists, radiographers and occupational therapists, were educated at UniSA's City East campus.

UniSA promotes practical experience and on campus you will find specialised podiatry, physiotherapy, mammography and ultrasound clinics. This gives students the valuable opportunity to work with members of the community and gain first-hand experience in their field.

On campus there is also a model pharmacy, sophisticated research equipment and multipurpose health science laboratories. Adjacent to City East is South Australia's largest hospital, the Royal Adelaide Hospital, providing access to valuable medical resources. Students can take time out from studying at City East by keeping fit at the fully equipped gym, taking a yoga or pilates class, grabbing a coffee at Aroma Café or relaxing with friends over lunch at the new outdoor plaza.

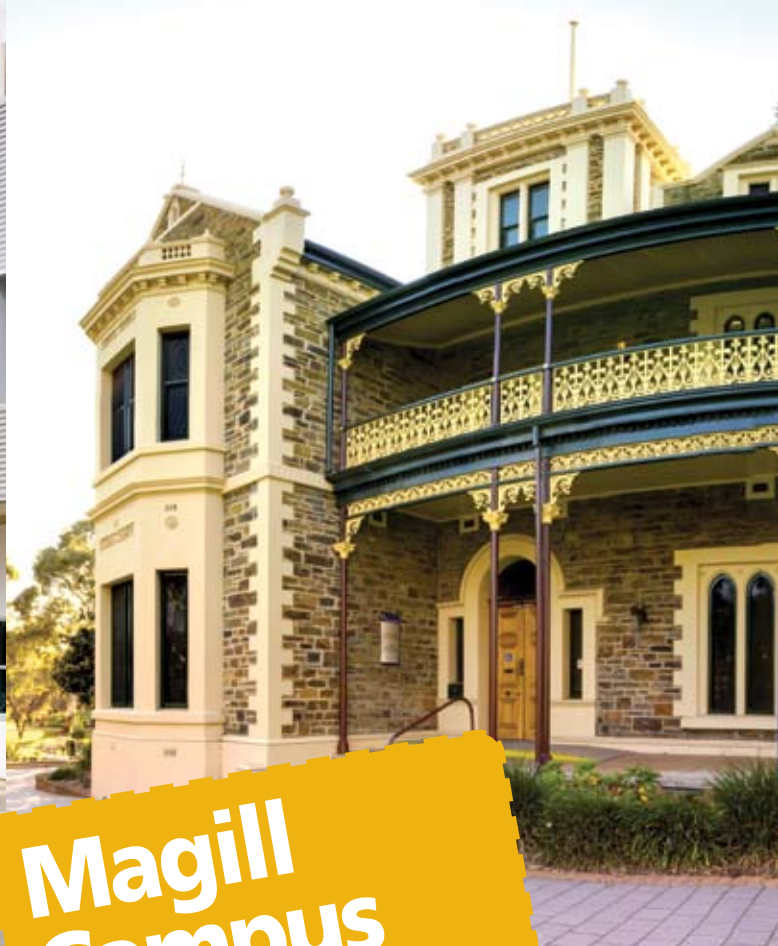

## Mawson Lakes Campus

**Mawson Lakes** is not just the site of UniSA's Information Technology, Engineering and the Environment campus. It is, in fact, a real-life showcase of future urban living. The 600 hectare site, just 12km north of the city of Adelaide, is the result of a collaboration between the local Council, private enterprise and UniSA. From the beginning, these three entities worked together to create a living example of what happens when innovation works with excellence. A university campus focused, amongst other things, on helping build a sustainable environment that has produced new ideas in recycled water, solar powered lighting and porous street pavers, surrounded by high quality residential housing that use these innovations, and supported by one of Australia's most forward thinking local councils. With a wide range of programs on offer, including engineering, computing and information technology, civil aviation, environmental management and sustainability, applied science and sports

science, Mawson Lakes is home to a large and diverse student population. UniSA's Division of Information Technology, Engineering and the Environment, has five academic schools, three research Institutes and 10 research centres at the Mawson Lakes campus. Well-equipped facilities, including machinery workshops, laboratories, the ecocentre and walk-up computers are located all around the campus. There is an interactive learning space for engineering students, an extensive library and collaborative links with adjacent Technology Park. The Mawson Centre provides a shared space for UniSA and the Mawson Lakes community, and boasts a library, lecture theatre and computer facilities. Significant extensions to the library have provided the campus with an open, modern space, equipped with dedicated study rooms, training facilities and increased computer access. Mawson Lakes campus is also home to the Adelaide Planetarium (the only one in Adelaide).



## Magill Campus

UniSA's **Magill campus** is nestled in Adelaide's leafy eastern suburbs, eight kilometres from the city centre. Set on almost 15 hectares of parklands, Magill is an impressive campus. Anchored by the historic Victorian villa, Murray House, the campus is surrounded by lush gardens and generous open spaces. There's even a creek that meanders through the parklands so it's an idyllic place to study.

Facilities on campus have been designed to enhance student engagement and include computer pools, wireless internet access, a mentor centre and a student common room with kitchen facilities. Program-specific amenities include a mini-newsroom, postgraduate study rooms, a theatre for stage productions, multimedia studios and editing suites. The library features designated study areas, comfortable lounges and comprehensive resource materials.

The Magill campus is considered the home of undergraduate studies in humanities, social sciences and education, so the library collection strengths include communication, new media, education, international studies, social work and social policy, languages and psychology. There is lots of room for sports and leisure activities at Magill. The campus has a swimming pool, gym, soccer fields and volleyball, badminton, basketball, indoor soccer and netball courts. The campus café and its adjoining outdoor dining areas are great places to unwind and catch up with friends.

## Whyalla Campus



UniSA's commitment to education, research and the development of robust and sustainable regional communities has a home at the **Whyalla campus** of the university. The Centre for Regional Engagement provides targeted undergraduate and postgraduate degree programs designed to meet the needs of rural and regional communities. Programs are offered in four areas: Business and Enterprise; Nursing and Rural Health; Social Work and Rural Practice and Engineering. Available also is UniSA Foundation Studies Regional Strand, a unique, free, tertiary preparation program, which is a one-year bridging program.

## Mt Gambier Campus



**Mount Gambier** sits exactly midway between the major cities of Adelaide and Melbourne on South Australia's south-east coastline. It is the largest regional city in the state and sits amidst volcanic craters in the nation's biggest softwood plantation. UniSA's campus, around 4km from the city, opened in 2005 and now has 250 students enrolled in degree programs in business, accounting, social work and nursing as well as a preparatory bridging program. Postgraduate study and research opportunities are currently being developed for the campus in conjunction with other Schools and units within UniSA.

## HOW TO APPLY

For midyear entry apply by June, for entry the following year apply by the end of September. You can still apply up to the beginning of December and be given equal consideration. Processing and late fees may apply. Apply online to SATAC (South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre) [www.satac.edu.au/uniweb](http://www.satac.edu.au/uniweb) or call (08) 8224 4000.

## AUSTRALIAN STUDENTS

UniSA offers maximum flexibility to people who want to study. There are many pathways to enter university; less than half of our students don't come straight from school. You may apply to enter UniSA through the Foundation Studies program, or the Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT), Open Universities Australia (OUA) but one of the best pathways is with your TAFE or RTO qualifications.

## ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER APPLICANTS

If you are an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person applying to study at UniSA, you may also qualify through special entry provisions. UniSA conducts programs to assist with preparation for university studies. ## APPLICANTS WITH A DISABILITY

If you have a disability, you will be considered for university entry through the usual pathways. ## LEARNING AT UNISA

Our programs consist of a number of courses taken over a number of academic years. Generally, your study schedule will be divided into contact hours (the time you spend in lectures, tutorials and practicums) and independent study hours (the time you devote to study, research, revision and assignments). Contact hours will vary, depending on the program you choose to study. Independent study hours will vary according to the individual but, as with other commitments, the more you put in, the more you'll get back.

## INVESTING IN YOUR FUTURE

UniSA is focused on providing you with education and experience relevant to the career you seek, meaning that you will be making a worthwhile investment in your future. While you may be able to defer program costs through the Commonwealth Government's Higher Education Loan Program (HECS-HELP), you may also need to pay for course materials and purchase textbooks, readers and equipment to support your studies. You will also need to consider other expenses associated with study such as the cost of travel to and from uni. ## UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

The ongoing costs associated with your university education can be difficult to manage, which is why UniSA offers a wide range of scholarships. These funds can be used towards fees, accommodation or general living expenses.

Our scholarships fall under many categories; some are designed to support students from rural or low socio-economic backgrounds, some are to motivate high achieving students and if you're interested in some time abroad you might qualify for a UniSA Student Exchange Travel Grant. Not only will you get to immerse yourself in the university life of another country, but UniSA could help out with your flights, accommodation and living expenses.

## GETTING THROUGH UNI

If you need financial assistance while at uni there are a number of options available:

- » Commonwealth Supported study is a government scheme that enables you to study at UniSA and defer payment until you're employed and are earning over a certain amount (\$43,151 for 2009-2010) per financial year;
- » Austudy is an income tested allowance for those over the age of 25 studying an approved program;
- » ABSTUDY provides support to Indigenous students to help with study and living expenses;
- » Youth Allowance is an income tested allowance for those under the age of 25 studying an approved program.

- » Talk to a UniSA Librarian about researching methods, borrowing policies and establishing a study pathway that will best suit you.
