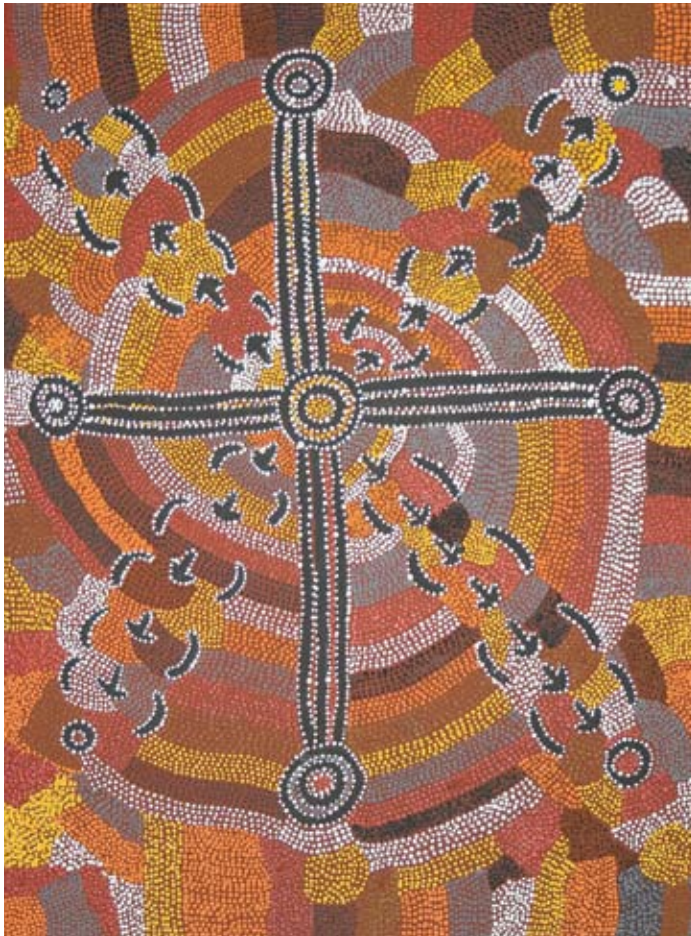

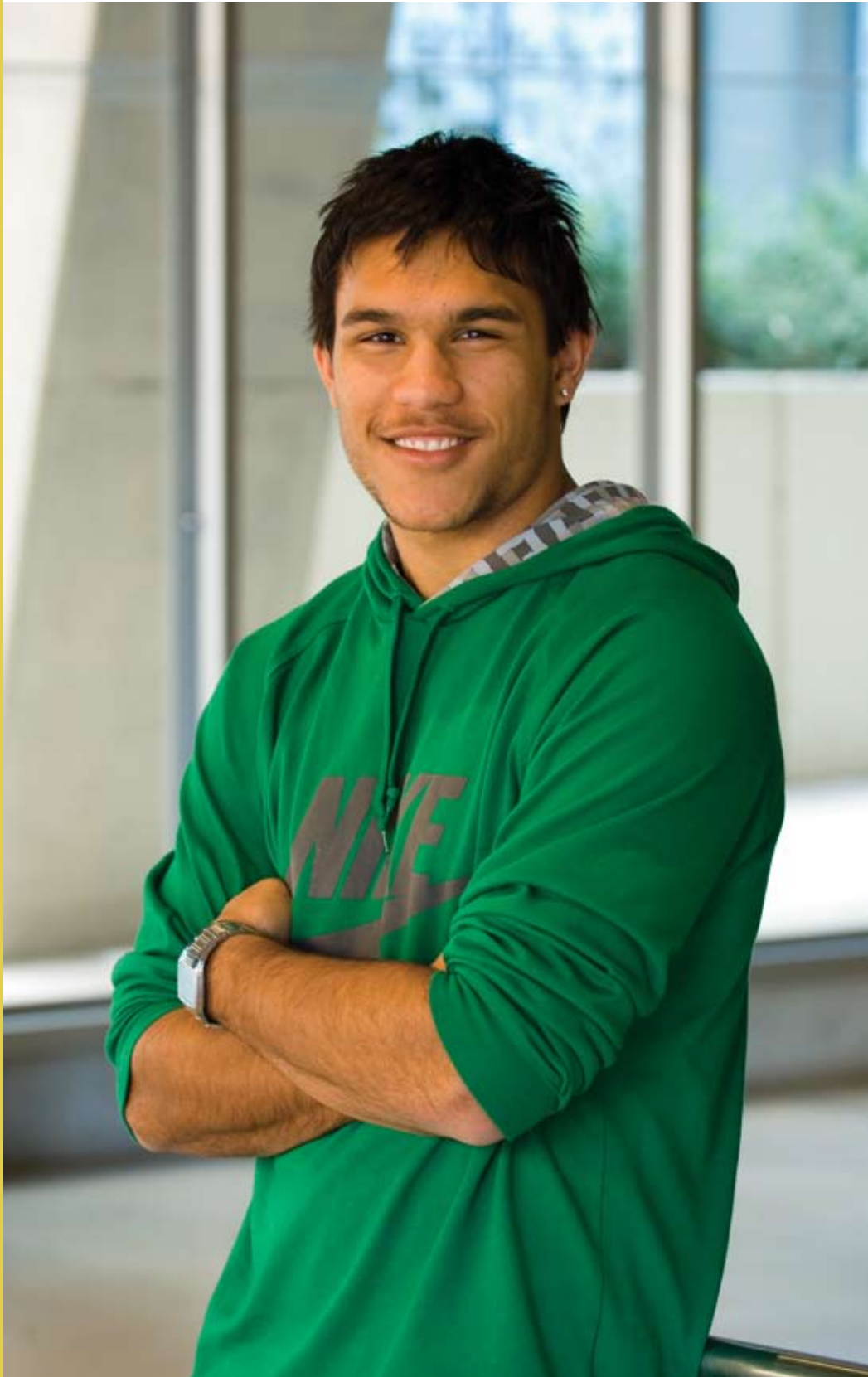
I was lucky when I went to school because I had good teachers, they were very effective in their role and they really helped me to finish high school. I was inspired by the way they taught me and I wanted to do the same for other high school kids, especially Indigenous students.

UniSA offered the degree I wanted to do; I am primarily based at Mawson Lakes and City West campuses. I would certainly recommend my program to others, it has great career pathways. I've found the teaching staff at UniSA to be exceptional; they are very friendly, approachable and easy going, they listen to my concerns and have given me great feedback on my work.

I have done work placement in schools in the first and second years of my degree; these are an opportunity to learn away from the classroom and put my skills into practice. I have learnt that it is essential to build a relationship with the kids and get their trust first before it's possible to put any behaviour management skills into practice.

Indigenous Student Services with access to tutoring and resources at my fingertips whenever I've needed them has without a doubt been a huge help with my studies.

I want to start teaching as soon as I'm qualified because I know how disadvantaged Indigenous students are in the field of education; they are always the ones sitting at the back of the class, being quiet when they should speak up. There are very few Indigenous teachers, particularly males and I want to try to help Indigenous students if I can, to be a good role model for the boys especially, as I know how much they are needed.



Our Commitment to Reconciliation

The University of South Australia seeks to respond to the challenges of nationhood and national identity in a way that comprehends Australia's past and gives hope for our future. In 1997, we became the first university in Australia to issue a Statement of Commitment to Australian Reconciliation.

We expressed our public commitment to the achievement of Australian Reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, a commitment based firmly upon:

- Acknowledgement of the unique position of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people as the Indigenous peoples of Australia and the original owners of this land, and recognition of their loss of land, children, languages, health and kin;
- The belief that reconciliation is a prerequisite for Australia to reach a mature nationhood which acknowledges the past, understands the present, and faces a future confidently based on the co-existence of rights;
- Acceptance that educational institutions have a particularly valuable contribution to make to the process of reconciliation by educating the Australian community about the cultures, languages, history and contemporary experiences of Australia's Indigenous peoples;

- Our special responsibility to provide leadership in the areas of Indigenous research and education, by virtue of its founding Act.

In 2000 we reaffirmed our commitment to reconciliation, with the unveiling of symbolic reconciliation rocks at each of the University's six campuses.

In October 2005 the University Council endorsed a recommendation that Indigenous content be a compulsory and assessable component of all undergraduate programs by 2010.

David Unaipon College of Indigenous Education and Research

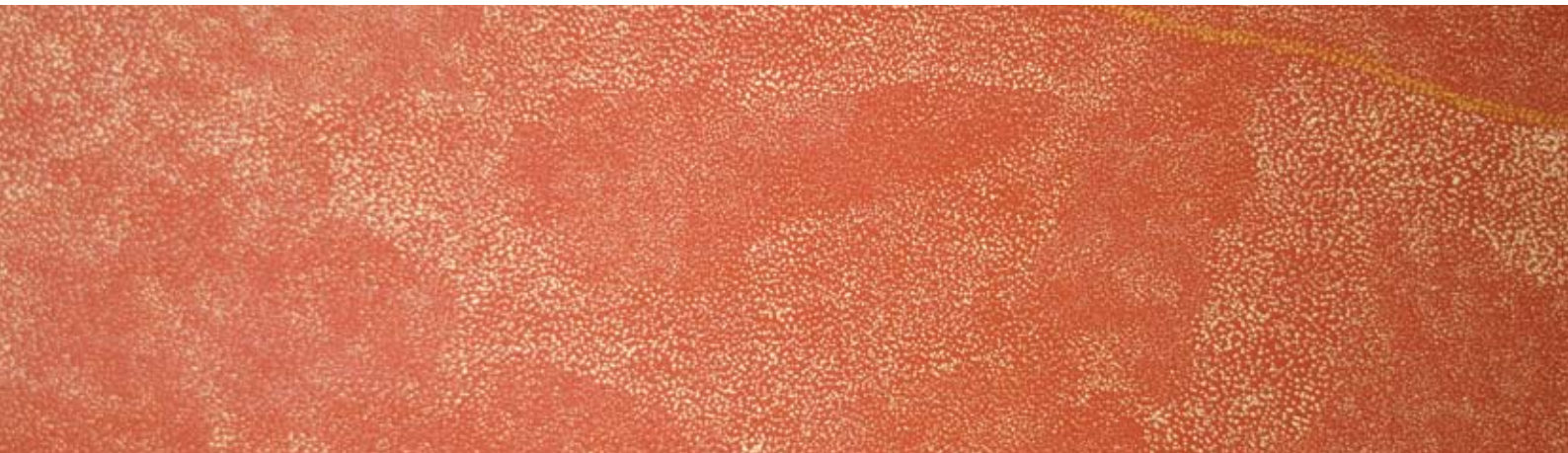

DUCIER comprises of:

DUCIER has four major responsibilities:

1. Provides advice to the University on all matters relating to Indigenous Australians as well as contributing to policy issues in the related areas.
2. Offers awards in Indigenous Studies and Australian Studies from the degree level through to PhD.
3. Facilitates and undertakes Indigenous related research and consultancy projects, locally, nationally and internationally.
4. Facilitates and manages Indigenous student entry into university awards and provides academic support services for Indigenous students.

Indigenous Tutorial Assistance

Indigenous Tutorial Assistance Scheme (ITAS) provides valuable assistance to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students studying at UniSA and is funded by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations.

The program offers students access to qualified tutors located in metropolitan and rural locations with skills and experience in a wide range of study areas. Tuition includes all areas of study such as program content, time management, academic writing skills, essay planning and referencing skills equipping students with the qualities and skills to graduate. Tutors are available to help with study and workload demands and to provide support and encouragement to assist with succeeding at University.

I've done a varied discipline of study, I did both my undergraduate and teaching degrees at UniSA and after graduating I just didn't leave! I am committed to the environment, education and now health.

Studying has taught me many things, I've grown on a personal level and learnt so much about knowledge and research. The teaching staff and students at UniSA come from lots of different backgrounds and there are Indigenous students in my degree which is comforting. I've attended overseas conferences relevant to my study and I've met many people from other cultures and have been exposed to world views. I've made life long friendships and had many opportunities that would not have occurred if I hadn't studied.

UniSA's teaching staff are understanding and the Indigenous Student Services have helped me through difficult times when I thought about quitting. They have provided support and helped me, the Indigenous and non-Indigenous librarians are really fantastic, nothing is ever too much to ask.

I didn't need to apply for Indigenous special entry but it was good to know that there was that option available. The Indigenous UniPrep program that runs the week before you start studying is really worthwhile and provided me with an edge over other students.

I am not an above average student, when I started studying my first degree I was a Pass 1 or a Pass 2 student, now I have developed my skills and I usually get distinctions. I'm persistent and determined and I have made a commitment to myself to succeed.

Port Augusta

The Port Augusta Study Centre is located on the second floor of D block in the Spencer Institute of TAFE, 9-39 Carlton Parade, Port Augusta.

Port Lincoln

The Port Lincoln Study Centre is centrally located at 38 Napoleon St, within easy walking distance of the city's major facilities including the main business and shopping areas, library and beautiful foreshore. Valued links are also maintained with the Indigenous community organisations located throughout Port Lincoln.

The Centre is open during business hours Monday to Thursday inclusive, and Friday mornings. After hours access for students is also negotiable.

The Centre now has nearly 50 graduates in a range of external undergraduate and post graduate programs including: Accountancy; Aboriginal Studies; Aboriginal Policy & Management; Arts, Social Sciences & Management; Community Development; Education; Nursing and Foundation Studies. Current students continue to reflect strong interest in these fields and are also expressing interest in programs such as Australian Studies and Social Work.

Features of the Port Lincoln Study Centre include: upgraded computing and IT facilities enabling easy access to the University's online environment; a small library; tutorial support via the Indigenous Tutorial Assistance Scheme (ITAS); academic and careers counselling and advocacy; private study areas; a venue for visiting UniSA staff and a strong peer support network.

As an off campus centre of the Indigenous Support Unit (ISS), we aim to provide an atmosphere that is conducive to study and also friendly, comfortable and welcoming.

Ceduna

The Ceduna Study Centre is centrally located at the Spencer Institute of TAFE, Ceduna. The centre is open for students 5 days a week between 9 – 5.

Ceduna is a relatively small town of about two thousand people, some eight hundred kilometres from Adelaide. A high proportion of the population of the town and district is Aboriginal, with affiliations to the former Lutheran Missions at Kooniba and Yalata, as well as Oak Valley, Port Augusta, Coober Pedy and Western Australia.

As Ceduna is a focus for many Aboriginal organisations there is a demand for programs in Aboriginal Administration at degree levels.

How to apply

Apply online to SATAC (South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre) by June for midyear entry. For entry the following year apply by the end of September or the beginning of December for equal consideration. Processing and late fees may apply.

Make sure that you tick the scholarships box on the application form when you apply.

Getting in

- » Prerequisites: SACE Stage 2 subjects that students must successfully complete and pass for entry into particular programs and courses;
- » Assumed knowledge: year 11/12 studies which enhance understanding of a program (eg Stage 2 Biology and Physics for Bachelor of Physiotherapy program)
- » USANET: UniSA's special access scheme for school leavers who may not otherwise have the opportunity to go to uni, either through economic circumstance or location;
- » Bonus points: points which are added to a year 12 student's university aggregate. UniSA has bonus points for higher level maths subjects;
- » A recognised Certificate 4 or Diploma from TAFE or a recognised higher education institution;
- » Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) for over 21 year olds going to uni for the first time;
- » Foundation Studies: programs that prepare students for entry into a range of undergraduate programs;
- » Deferment: delaying starting a program by one year. Your offer of a place is guaranteed for the following year although you must formally re-accept and pay the application fee. Not all programs allow students to defer.

Special Entry for Indigenous students

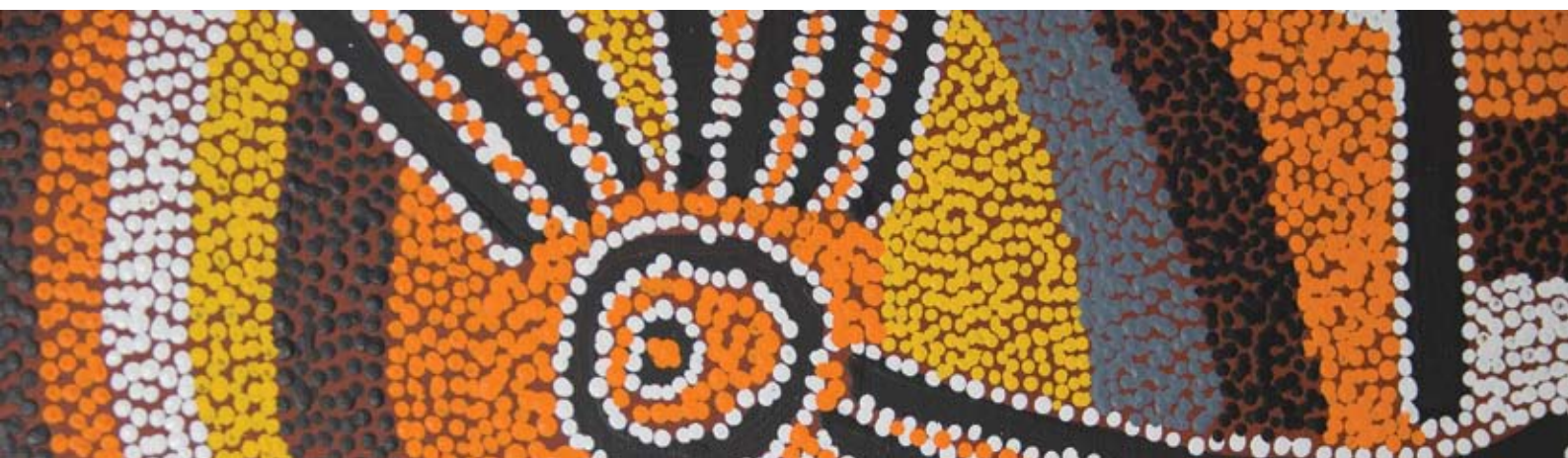
A method of special entry is provided by Indigenous Student Services (ISS) for Indigenous people who do not have the relevant qualifications to enter a UniSA program.

If you have completed Year 12 or a TAFE Certificate level 3 or 4 you can apply directly to enter UniSA at SATAC (South Australia Tertiary Admissions Centre) go to www.satac.edu.au/uniweb

If you haven't completed Year 12, a TAFE award or you do not have any other qualifications you can apply for UniSA's Indigenous Special Entry.

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Indigenous UniPrep Program

Starting university can be easier if you know what to expect. You may be wondering how lectures and tutorials work, about your study options, or what you'll do when you have some time off from studying. University life is about both intellectual and personal development. It's the combination of what you'll learn throughout your studies, and who you'll meet, that will create your UniSA experience.

Indigenous Student Services (ISS) conducts an intensive preparation program for commencing Indigenous students:

- to introduce the full range of facilities where new students will be studying, and those which ISS provides, particularly the support role of their ISS home-campus academic advisor;
- to provide information and assistance in applying for commencing scholarships;
- to ensure that new students have a sound understanding of relevant University procedures before they begin study;
- to build rapport among commencing students and Indigenous staff, particularly between each student and their ISS home-campus academic advisor;
- to introduce the UniSA online environment and ensure that students can use this facility or know where to access help;
- to replicate in part the study load and pressure that students will encounter once the semester begins, in basic assignments, use of the Library and group presentations.

The overall purpose of the Indigenous UniPrep Program is to provide a solid and comfortable foundation for commencing Indigenous students, which will support them throughout their studies.

Learning at UniSA

Our programs consist of a number of courses taken over a number of academic years. Generally, your study schedule will be divided into contact hours (the time you spend in lectures, tutorials and practicals) and independent study hours (the time you devote to study, research, revision and assignments). Contact hours will vary, depending on the program you choose to study. Independent study hours will vary according to the individual but, as with other commitments, the more you put in, the more you'll get back.

Some of the nuts-and-bolts terms you'll come across at uni include:

- » Program: the award in which you are enrolled, eg Bachelor of Applied Finance;
- » Course: a component of study within a program, ie, a subject;
- » Unit: the 'value' of a course which measures the amount of work in that course. Full-time students normally undertake 36 units a year (commonly eight courses) to gain the 108 units needed to earn a three-year degree;
- » Discipline: a field of study or knowledge;
- » Division: UniSA is split into four academic Divisions – each offering a range of specialised programs and courses:
 - Business
 - Education, Arts and Social Sciences
 - Health Sciences
 - Information Technology, Engineering and the Environment.

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Classes

Managing your academic timetable and attending classes will be a big factor in your success at uni.

- » The academic year for most programs begins late February or early March and ends in November. Exams are in June and November.
- » Lectures are usually held in a large lecture theatre with other students for an hour or two. They offer an opportunity to listen and take notes about the main concepts covered in your course.
- » Tutorials, or workshops, are run by tutors for smaller groups of students and are an interactive way to share thoughts, ask questions and generate discussion about course content.
- » Practicals may take place in a laboratory, on a computer or with other specialised equipment, depending on the course. They provide opportunities to develop practical skills and apply theories learned in lectures and tutorials.

Your study options

Depending on the program you choose, you may have options about where, when and how you'd prefer to study.

- » Full-time study requires the completion of 36 units per year, but your contact hours may vary depending on your program. If you are studying on campus you will attend lectures, tutorials or workshops and/or practical classes;
- » Part-time study allows you to study a program over a longer period of time. You'll study less than 75 per cent of a normal full-time load and can undertake between one and three courses per study period.
- » Off-campus (external) study allows you to undertake all or some of your courses from home, using supplied print materials and online study resources. You may occasionally need to attend some on-campus classes or field placements.

Assessment and grading

To pass a course you must satisfactorily complete the relevant assessment requirements. That assessment may include exams, written assignments, presentations, practical work and/or class participation. Depending on the courses you undertake, your assessment will be graded according to the University's marking system.

When you've satisfactorily met all program and UniSA requirements, you'll be eligible to graduate. Qualifying for a degree from UniSA is a major achievement and you will be able to celebrate your success with family and friends at your graduation ceremony (usually held in April, August and December).

UniSA online

First things first: you can enroll online or take a virtual tour of any of our campuses. UniSA's flexible online environment means you can log in from anywhere, 24/7. In addition to numerous modern computing facilities, all the campuses are linked to a wireless network so you can study where and when you like.

As a UniSA student you will have your own web page and email address. Lecturers often correspond through discussion groups linked to course homepages. It's also likely you'll submit assignments and discuss work with other students online.

The STEP (Student Experience) 2010 agenda

UniSA is strengthening our proven ability to provide teaching and learning experiences that produce graduates with outstanding, profession-ready qualities. The STEP 2010 initiative further enhances our reputation as a leader in providing practice-based and workplace learning in our programs and also looks at innovative learning spaces that are more than the traditional lecture theatre. The ambitious agenda aims to ensure that, by 2010, approximately one-third of all learning experiences in all UniSA programs will be real-world experiences. This will be achieved by strengthening the use of practice-based learning, the teaching-research nexus and service learning in the community in our programs. This means that all UniSA students will experience real-world challenges in innovative and interactive learning spaces throughout their program of study.

Real-world experience

UniSA is known for its links with industry and the professions.

- » Work placements offer students the chance to get into a real-world work situation where you can apply the knowledge and skills learned at uni to your future workplace;
- » Field trips are short excursions or longer trips – sometimes even overseas – where students gain practical insight into their field of study and learn a range of relevant skills;
- » Overseas student exchanges provide the chance to study at one of more than 90 accredited international universities. An international exchange will contribute to your personal and professional development and will be highly regarded by your future employers.

Health care has always been an area that appeals to me. It is a privilege to help others and I am particularly passionate about improving health care and attitudes towards health especially in Aboriginal communities.

I get excellent support from the academic advisers at the Indigenous Student Services and from other Indigenous students. I really enjoy having access to our own study room, this ensures that we get all the support and access to the resources we need. UniSA teaching staff are extremely approachable, they respond to my emails promptly and are extremely helpful and informative.

In my first semester of study I took workshops in simulated hospital wards which gave me great insight into the hospital environment and the working conditions. I think this is a great foundation for learning and professional development. I hope that once I'm qualified, I will be equipped with the right knowledge and skills to become influential in a health care setting but also to be able to influence other young people to become actively involved in caring for their community.

My Indigenous Student Adviser has been such an asset in my study. Her advice has always been to my benefit and helped me make informed decisions about my study plans and time management of my work/study/life. I really enjoy studying at City East campus all the facilities are in close proximity to each other. The Indigenous Student Services is a great facility to have access to; I hope other students can enjoy the same for many years to come.

I think that study is a gateway to an exciting future. If you are unsure of what you need to do, the Indigenous Student Advisers and the resources available to you are excellent and definitely worth considering for your future studies.



Where you'll live



UniSA Accommodation Services helps students find affordable and appropriate accommodation to suit different needs and budgets. While the University doesn't own or operate accommodation facilities (except at the Whyalla campus), we do have a range of options from which to choose. These include residential colleges, student hostels, student apartments, private rentals and full-board homestays. Prices range from around \$100 to \$300 per person, per week depending on the level of luxury you choose.

Long-term accommodation options

Student hostels give you the opportunity to live in a reasonably priced, comfortable, secure and supervised environment. Many students studying in Adelaide for the first time stay in a student hostel for at least half the academic year in order to benefit from the network of support systems set up to help them settle in. Student hostels generally provide a furnished single bedroom containing a bed, a desk, a chair, a phone and a wardrobe. There are shared bathroom, kitchen and laundry facilities and there may be extra costs if meals are included. Prices start from \$100 per week in the metropolitan area (\$80 per week in Whyalla) or \$140 to \$210 per week for rent plus meals. Prices vary depending on location and room size. Some hostels offer nightly rates outside study periods.

Residential colleges' facilities differ from rentals and hostels in that students normally have access to computers with online access to universities and the internet, library, music rooms and sporting facilities. Some also offer access to tutors. All colleges are located in North Adelaide which is a 10-15-minute walk from the city. Prices range from \$200 per week for a single room with a shared bathroom to \$600 per week for a two-person unit. Price includes breakfast and dinner.

Student apartments range from one-, two-, three- or four-bedroom units that accommodate single students or whole groups. They are usually self-contained, furnished or unfurnished, with bathroom and kitchen facilities and each student has his/her own bedroom or study. Normally the duration of leases is one year with rents varying between \$100 to \$200 per bedroom, per week according to the size and type of accommodation.

Private rentals' prices vary according to the location and style of accommodation you choose. According to the Real Estate Institute of Australia, Adelaide is Australia's cheapest capital city in which to rent, with a three-bedroom house costing around \$255 per week and about \$205 per week for a two-bedroom apartment. Most private rentals are unfurnished and located in the suburbs of Adelaide so furniture and public transport costs must be factored in. You can reduce costs by sharing with other students; sharing is often the cheapest option but it means finding compatible people to live with. When sharing it's best to agree on house rules, the division of chores and how the bills will be split up before you move in.

Full board/homestay options are relatively flexible, with the student and the host usually negotiating charges and services. Some host families provide the ingredients for breakfast and lunch and will cook one meal per day. Usually weekend arrangements are flexible. Washing, ironing and cleaning are often negotiable. Costs range from \$130 to \$235 per week, depending on the services provided.

Scholarships, fees, help

Studying at UniSA offers the opportunity to gain the qualifications, experience and personal attributes you need to succeed in your chosen career. Your decision to undertake tertiary study should be well considered, both in terms of your professional goals and your options regarding the costs involved.

Financial help

If you need financial assistance while at uni there are a number of options available:

- » Commonwealth Supported study is a government scheme that enables you to study at UniSA and defer payment until you're employed and are earning a certain amount (\$41,595 for 2008–2009 only) per financial year;
- » ABSTUDY provides support to Indigenous students to help with study and living expenses;
- » Youth Allowance is an income-tested allowance for those under the age of 25, studying an approved program.

Investing in your future

UniSA is focused on providing you with education and experience relevant to the career you seek, meaning you will be making a worthwhile investment in your future. While you may be able to defer program costs through the Commonwealth Government's Higher Education Loan Program (HECS-HELP), you may also need to pay for course materials and administrative fees. You will be required to purchase textbooks, readers and equipment to support your studies. You will also need to consider other expenses associated with study, such as the cost of travel to and from uni.

Pay now or pay later

The HELP scheme has been established by the Australian Government to assist students to pay the costs of their education. There are three loans within the scheme and Australian undergraduate students may be eligible for the HECS-HELP loan. If you are a Commonwealth Supported student you may be able to defer your payment through a HECS-HELP loan or make a discounted upfront payment of your fees.

Your payments will depend on the program you study, and student contribution pricing bands are subject to change. The approximate pricing bands for courses are outlined in the table below.

Your HECS-HELP loan amount will be paid by the government directly to UniSA. Once you are employed you will repay the loan through the income tax system when your earnings reach \$41,595 (for 2008–2009 only) per financial year.

- » Undergraduate students who are Australian citizens or holders of permanent humanitarian visas are generally eligible for the HECS-HELP loan and do not have to pay their fees upfront. You'll be provided with an information booklet when you enrol at UniSA.
- » New Zealand citizens, and people who have been granted permanent residency in Australia, are eligible for Commonwealth Supported places but will need to pay their fees upfront.
- » Other international students are required to pay upfront tuition fees set by the University and should contact UniSA's International Office on (08) 8302 0114 or visit www.unisa.edu.au/inthome

Do you have to move from the country to study at UniSA? Then you may be eligible for a one off payment of \$4,080 and all you have to do is apply! You will receive half the scholarship as soon as you accept your offer.

If you receive this scholarship then you may also qualify for these:

Commonwealth Scholarships

There are two types of scholarships, CAS and CECS. CECS helps with general education costs. Value: \$2,162 per year

CAS and CECS Indigenous Enabling Scholarships assists Indigenous students undertake an eligible enabling course as a pathway to undergraduate study. This new scholarship provides up to an additional year of scholarship funding, students who move from an eligible enabling course to an undergraduate degree course will have up to five years access to a Commonwealth Scholarship, when linked to an Ordinary or Associate Degree CECS and/or CAS.

Ordinary CAS and CECS – up to 4 years funding available for applicants wanting to study an Undergraduate Degree.

CAS and CECS Associate Degree Scholarships – up to 2 years funding available for applicants wanting to study an Associate Degree. CAS assists with accommodation and relocation costs. Value: \$4,324 per year.

Priority is given to Indigenous students and those from rural and regional areas. Payments are made twice a year – one payment for half the annual value of a CAS or CECS in each scholarship period.
